Dear Friends

The Nation will pause and remember at 11 am on both the 11th and 12th of



November those who gave their lives in the defence of freedom in the face of those who actively sought to control, and for some, destroy it altogether. The Royal British Legion, the custodian of the pledge to remember the supreme sacrifice as a Nation within each generation, is focusing this year, amongst other Anniversaries, on the physical, mental, or emotional injury or trauma endured by those on the front line, and the impact of conflict and absence from loved ones, on those at home.

A worrying statistic is the number of ex Service Personnel who carry the emotional, psychological, and physical scars of war long after their experiences, and find it difficult to share their pain, with all the impact upon their families and others. It is good that part of the legacy of remembering is the need to offer ongoing care, support, counselling, and practical and financial assistance to ex Service personnel who are traumatised or fall on hard times. The Poppy Appeal is one way of raising much needed funds to ensure that remembering needs to be now, as well as focusing rightly on the names of the Fallen on War Memorials across the Nation at this time of the year.

In our minds this year will be the continuing conflicts that rage across the world in Ukraine, Sudan, Syria, Yemen and in The Middle East in Israel and Gaza and the catastrophe of shattered lives and communities as a result. The hope that no

more lives with much promise would have to be laid down was very strong in the minds of those who witnessed the Armistice in 1918 after the appalling loses suffered in The Great War, and that continues to be our prayer, hope and resolve today as we witness the images of death and destruction and hear heartbreaking stories of loss.



As we stand in silence, we weep in sorrow that humanity has failed to grasp the tragedies of past conflicts and suffering, and pray that peace with justice, together with love replacing enmity and hatred, will be the ultimate victor.

Farming News

A very busy month so a shortened



version this month. We are busy TB testing last week and this week and struggling for staff as Max who has worked for us for three years has gone to New Zealand for the winter. Hopefully he will be back in the Spring ready for the calving season. All the cows and calves are still outside as the grass is so long and green so we are having to test

each herd with a borrowed crush which can be towed behind the tractor.

I think I mentioned last month we had lost a large acreage of land near Fin Cop as the owner is planting 70,000 trees as he receives a huge incentive from DEFRA. Neil is obviously rather upset as it is good productive land so we have written the following letter to the Farmers Weekly - hopefully it will be published!

Dear Editor,

Shouldn't there be a check on whether Government funded tree planting is damaging food production?

One of my landlords has recently taken a significant area of productive land back in-hand, as he can receive money from a DEFRA funded tree planting scheme. Who can blame him? I have no problem with poor quality land being planted but when it is productive land there should be checks in place. The UK is only 60% self-sufficient in food, that has slipped from around 80% in the 1980's. So do we really want to drop back to Second World War levels of around 30%? Yes, trees are an important part of the environment, but it has to be right tree, right place.

SHELDON JOTTINGS

What a month we have all just experienced. In early October we were treated to a Luke's summer – warm, dry, sunny weather with temperatures of 20+C. The name is a reference to St Luke's Day on the 18th October. Then later in the month the temperatures fell back to the mid-teens, 'normal' for the time of year said the meteorologists. But then along came Storm Babet, cloud, rain, rain and more rain, windy and more rain. Water cascading down the roads and over saturated fields. causing the rivers to rise to levels not seen for many years and with disastrous consequences. The words 'Climate Change' became commonly used. What the winter holds for us is anyone's guess!

On the brighter side are the wonderful colours of the leaves — reds, yellows and that perennial favourite the wonderful copper brown of the Beech. Who cannot wonder, on a damp dew soaked morning at this time of year, at the view across the valley to the north of the village, when the sun is shining on a bright white layer of fog trapped there, obscuring all but the tops of a few trees and hills.

As we write an event has come to our notice which will take place at the end of October – the

completion of the restoration of the old, historic village water tank.
More about that in December's Jottings.

As well as this we shall all be treated to an extra hour in bed on the night of the 28/29th. First championed by William Willet who published a pamphlet in 1907 entitled 'The Waste of Daylight'. The change which we now tend to know as British Summer Time became law as The Summer Time Act in 1916. The arguments in favour of the change ranged from promoting the greater use of daylight for recreational purposes, lessening the use of public houses, and to reduce expenditure on artificial light. Among the detractors were newspaper publishers who argued that cricket matches would end so late that there would not be enough time to report the scores in the next day's papers and farmers who argued that there would be no advantage in the change, presumably because they rose early anyway.

The end of October and beginning of November is always a busy time for the children with Halloween on October 31st and Guy Fawkes Night on November 5th.

Then at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day, of the eleventh month we remember all those who have given their lives in the service of their country in time of need.

When we lay a wreath in the Remembrance Service in our little Church, foremost in our minds will be the sacrifice of the five brave young men from the village who gave their lives for their country in World War One and whose names are commemorated in the memorial tribute to them.
