## FARMING NEWS

Another busy week! At the beginning of



every week I always think surely this must be quieter and less hectic than the previous one — invariably it's just as manic.
Goodness knows how I used to work full time at the butcher's as well. Even now I find myself catching up with office work three or four nights a week. Last week we harvested the maize on one of those lovely bright and sunny days so now we can say " all is safely gathered

in". The contractor worked until 10 pm to finish, and the next morning we were ploughing to sow winter wheat. We finished the first field but have Hassop and a field up Pennyunk Lane and then thank goodness the field work is finished until Spring. We are in the middle of the TB Testing marathon. Our lovely vet Danny is leaving in November to go to St Kitts. I have always said these young vets haven't spent 6 years training to be a TB tester – it's an awful job for them and most farms don't have good handling facilities and are out in the open, often pushing cattle behind a gate to inject, getting wet, dirty and extremely cold. Fortunately our handling system is under cover and the race is long so we can get 8 cows in quite easily.

Yesterday we tested over 300 in 2 hours which is pretty good going. Will reads the eartag number, I write down the numbers and Max and Ben push the cattle into the race. The secret is to have plenty of flasks of tea and flapjack to keep them going. First the vet has to clip the hair on the animals neck then two different injections so it's not a simple job for the vet. Emily is a new vet to the Bakewell practice and not very tall so her arms

must have been aching after yesterday morning but she was really quick and efficient. Not only do they have to do this twice a year for every livestock farm in the area but also to each cow when it is moved to a different farm or sold in market called a pre-movement test. They have to come for a second visit three days later to check there are no reactions in the form of a lump on the neck so again each animal has to be pushed through the race and checked.

We have to pay for the privilege of using our local vets and so it costs us in the region of £2000. The Ministry will foot the bill if you use their vets but mostly they are much slower, very often vets who don't speak good English and also don't arrive when they say they are going to! We therefore use our vets who know us and our system of farming.

## VILLAGE ALBUM AUTUMN IN ASHFORD



















#### **SHELDON JOTTINGS**

The wonderful copper hues of the beech trees with the sun shining through them epitomise the autumnal delights during mid to late October. The small village wood at the side of the playing field looks resplendent and we thank those who thought about setting all those trees which eventually gives us this wonderful scenery. The only disadvantage with having trees is clearing up all those pesky leaves if they fall all over the garden!

The Harvest Service and Supper in the Cock and Pullet was very well attended. Canon Tony gave a short service for the harvest safely gathered in – an important part of the annual cycle of life and thanksgiving. When the pie and peas were consumed, with no doubt a hearty drink to wash them down, everyone participated in a lively Bingo session. Thank you Kath and all your helpers for the hard work in arranging a most enjoyable and entertaining evening.

Later in the month several members of the village joined the Bakewell and District Historical Society to hear a talk by Colin Merrony from the University of Sheffield about the discovery in 2022 of a prehistoric circular bank and ditch or 'henge' at Sheldon. This is now one of three in

the Peak District. The henge is sited on a spur which slopes towards the north-east between the valleys of Kirk Dale and little Shacklow Wood. Archaeological digs have taken place at the site over the last two years. These have revealed a circular bank with a ditch inside it with an entrance from the east which, following the initial dig in 2023, was dated to the late Neolithic or Early Bronze Age around 3,500 to 3,000BC. During this dig some animal bones and Mezolithic chert and flint tools were discovered, helping to give the date.



On the basis of the promising finds during the first dig, a second dig was undertaken this year. The 2023 trenches were extended and a new trench was added in the centre of the henge. Here, discoveries added a wealth of new information to our knowledge such as post holes and pits. Even more interesting were shards of rather primitive pottery with indentations showing some form of patterning and dating from the late Bronze Age (1500 – 1000 BC), evidence that there was activity

at the site for at least 2000 years. There was also evidence of a further entrance on the western side of the Henge.

Colin also gave some indications of why the Henge was built and why it was sited here. Henges with the ditch inside the bank were sited close to ancient routeways which followed landscape features and were thought to be meeting places. People following the River Wye could have been aware of Sheldon Henge. Colin is hopeful that a further more extensive dig can be undertaken at this site but, as always, obtaining the funding will determine when this can take place. However, he was in no doubt that the site is of archaeological significance – all very exciting for Sheldon!

We will remember that November 5th is Bonfire Night! But we must also remember that on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> November, Remembrance Sunday, there will be a Service in our Church to remember the five young men from the village and the thousands of others who gave their lives in two World Wars in the defence of our country's interests prior to Armistice Day on the 11<sup>th</sup> November.

# Wine of the month

#### **CUNE Imperial Rioja Reserva 2018**

Rioja has rather lost its way recently. The region has been overproducing for some years and many of the younger wines seem stretched and just don't say 'Rioja' in the way they used to. However four traditional companies ('bodegas') have kept their standards high: Bodegas La Rioja Alta, Lopez de Heredia, Muga and CVNE. The latter stands for Compañia Vinicola del Norte de España but is often referred to simply as 'Cune'. It was founded in 1879 and is still family owned. To my mind, a good Rioja needs age in wood to show its true character. This wine, a Reserva, spends a year in seasoned French and American oak before bottling to soften the natural tannins and give it that classic, soft vanilla character that complements the fruit on the nose and palate. The mostly Tempranillo grapes are blended with small quantities of Graciano, Mazuelo and Garnacha from some of the best Rioja vineyards. But it's the age in oak that really makes the difference and you can enjoy this now, over the winter, or cellar it for a few more years. I recently opened a CVNE Gran Reserva Rioja from 1989 and it was still in really fabulous condition. Rioja and roast lamb make a perfect combination for the autumn. Look for this wine on the top shelf in Bakewell Co-op. They are just about

to move on from the 2018 vintage to 2019. And if you are looking for a white wine to serve beforehand, try the barrel-fermented (and therefore gently oaked Cune) white Rioja 2022 at £9 a bottle.

As a Speak out Stay safe volunteer, you will visit primary schools to deliver Speak out Stay safe workshops that teach children about the different types of abuse and how they can speak out and stay safe. Our Speak out Stay safe workshops are ageappropriate and memorable and need an energetic and enthusiastic person to deliver them. You'll work alongside other Speak out Stay safe volunteers to make sure at the end of each session the children feel empowered and know who they can speak out to if they are worried.

- Meet with staff as well as volunteers to ask any questions you may have
