HOLY TRINITY CHURCH, ASHFORD-IN-THE-WATER



First envisioned in 2017 by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, the Church of England's Living in Love and Faith course is designed to support Christian teaching and learning about identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage, and to encourage information sharing and personal reflection.

Given that same-sex marriage, and blessings of same-sex marriages, are controversial within the Church of England, the PCC feels that now would be a good time to educate ourselves about the relevant biblical, theological, historical and scientific perspectives – not necessarily to change anyone's mind, but just to inform ourselves as individuals and as a parish church.

An analysis in 2022 of responses from 6,448 people who had taken the course revealed that most found it to be a positive experience, and 73% would recommend it to others.

The course comprises five 1.5 hour sessions, each one including an opening reflection about learning together; teaching videos; videos of real-life stories; a discussion; bible study; and prayer and reflection. The sessions will take place in the vestry of Ashford Church on the following dates:
